## WILPF Congress, April 2015

The WILPF triennial Congress has been held regularly since 1915, with only a few exceptions.

At the Congress members of WILPF adopt the policies and programmes that the WILPF International Board and WILPF Executive committee follow till the next congress.

Members of the Executive Committee, standing committees and working groups are also elected at congress.

In 2015 Congress will be held in the Peace Palace, The Hague, Netherlands where the first meeting of women who formed WILPF met in April 1915.

# WILPF 100th Anniversary, April 2015

## Women's Power To Stop War

In April 2015 WILPF will be 100 years old, making us the longest-standing women's anti-war organisation in the world. WILPF International is developing a plan to help us celebrate this great achievement, and there will be anniversary events throughout the year.

The theme of the anniversary is 'Women's Power to Stop War'. WILPF has set up a website:

which is being updated regularly, and where you can sign the Anniversary pledge (*more about that below*).

The anniversary will have three main parts—the WILPF triennial Congress in The Hague, Netherlands in April 2015; then an international conference which will also be held in The Hague straight after congress, and what is being called the 'Movement'. The Movement

will commemorate the collective work that WILPF women have done over the past 100 years to stop war and create sustainable, global peace. It will also be forward-looking, so that we can celebrate our past, present and future.

The Movement will work at an international, regional, national and local level—just as WILPF itself does.

## Anniversary Pledge

- We/I **support** women's right to political, social, and economic participation and pledge to support Women's Power to Stop War. Like the women in 1915, who came together from across the world to stop World War I,
- We/I **oppose** the assumption that civilians, especially women, can be safe under the conditions of modern warfare, and believe that peace and security should be analyzed from a gender perspective.
- We/I **know** the only sustainable protection is the prevention of armed conflict through dialogue, which addresses the root causes of conflict.
- We/I **call** for global demilitarization built on the foundation of human rights, including complete disarmament, the implementation of the Women, Peace and Security Agenda, and the redirection of military expenditures to meet social and environmental needs.
- We/I **believe** that by connecting women lo-

cally to globally in support of multilateralism and against patriarchy, we can build sustainable peace for all.

We/I hereby **pledge** to engage in the 100 year long struggle to demand Women's Power to Stop War.
